Our Curriculum

Our inspiring and engaging curriculum is introduced to the children through a 'launch day' which brings the children's learning to life and engages them in their learning.

Each learning journey is carefully planned and sequenced to ensure a fluid curriculum design which builds on skills and knowledge to a clear end piece and celebration. Each classroom is a language rich environment reflecting the learning that is being absorbed and immerses the learning of a range of subjects within that learning journey.

Children are effectively scaffolded and challenged within their learning through carefully prepared and attractive resources. Our curriculum is centred around active learning, and quality resources which expose our pupils to new vocabulary which ensures every child is effectively supported and can flourish.

Teachers ask three questions as part of each journey to know that learning is secure and purposeful: What are we learning about? Why are we learning about it? How are we going to be successful? Pupils return back to these questions during the learning sessions to allow them to reflect on their learning.

Pupils at our school take on a role in their learning and become artists, geographers, scientists, historians, theologians and so many real-life roles. We believe it is important that children understand the real-life application of their learning and that a subject is not merely something we learn in school, but it has implications all around us. For example; We Are Designers – with a focus on a design brief and an understanding that everything we use has been designed for a purpose. Children's books also reflect these roles.



Governors

School governors are volunteers who help to run our school and make up our 'Local Governing Body'.

Governors are involved in the strategic decisions of the school; for example, running buildings and budgets, ensuring health and safety measures are in place, supporting staff and setting standards of school discipline. They also contribute to the school's long-term goals. They support the Head Teacher and make sure the school is always heading in the right direction.

Home - School Partnership

Communication

We truly believe in the importance of home-school communication. It is essential that key events, developments and challenges are discussed regularly to ensure your child receives the best start to their education.

We can only solve problems we are made aware of and would ask that you bring them to our attention. There are many ways you can do this such as speaking to a member of staff in person, communicating via SeeSaw or phoning our school office.

Meet and Greet

Pupils are greeted each morning on the gates and at external doors by staff members and messages can be passed on to relevant teachers.

Teachers will be available to discuss anything with you at morning drop off from 08:35 to 08:45 and afternoon collection from 15:15. The Senior Leadership Team will also be available to discuss any concerns you may have. Please speak to the school office to arrange an appointment outside of these hours.

Parent/Carer Handbook

This is shared with parents and carers to hopefully provide you with everything you need to know about the day-to-day workings of our school.

Regular newsletters are also sent via email, and our SeeSaw App.

SeeSaw APP

Our SeeSaw APP is our main form of communication. It includes regularly updated learning posts, message section and weekly news.

Sharing Learning

We will be using an online Learning Journal called 'SeeSaw' which will ensure we can record your child's achievements and share these with you. This will correlate with their developmental milestones and provide next steps that you can focus on at home. You will also be able to provide your child's home learning achievements through the SeeSaw App which will provide a rounded picture of all the amazing things your child is achieving.

We will invite you to parents/carers evenings where we can discuss development, however if you have any questions or concerns please feel free to speak to class teachers who are always happy to discuss with you.

Home-Learning

We assign 'Homework Menus' on SeeSaw each half-term. These include a range of activities for you to choose from, and homework can then be brought into school or shared via SeeSaw. We will also provide reading books for your child (decodable books linked to their phonics level, as well as a 'book for pleasure' which can be read to them).





Behaviour

At Lower Farm Academy, we have the highest expectations for our pupils so that they can all be the best that they can be.

Our Behaviour Policy clearly demonstrates how we nurture children and proactively work with our families at Lower Farm. We promote a high standard of behaviour and have a positive ethos where all members of the school community are valued as individuals, we believe in encouraging the development of self-esteem, respect for others and self-discipline.



Emphasis is placed on positive reinforcement of behaviour through praise in accordance with our school values. Children's confidence and self-esteem are developed through encouragement and incentives, both verbal and written. School Dinners

Our school dinners are prepared and cooked on site using fresh ingredients. There is a wide selection of choices available. If you would like a menu, please look on our website.

School dinners are charged at £2.60 daily (subject to change). If you would like your child to have a school meal, booking and payment must be made in advance via Parent Pay.

Children eligible for Pupil Premium are entitled to a free school meal. Please complete the attached form if you think you are eligible.

All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are eligible for Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) and will receive a school meal free of charge if requested.

Pupil Premium and UIFSM children can still select their meal choices in advance via Parent Pay.

Parent Pay

We are a cashless school. All booking for lunches, trips, breakfast club and nursery fees are done electronically through Parent Pay.





Attendance

School attendance is vital for pupil's development physically, emotionally and socially.

It is important that your child attends every day and on time – **gates open at 08:35 and are locked at 08:45** when the school day officially starts.

Children should only be kept at home if they have a serious illness or injury. If this is the case, parents must call the school by **08:45**.

Pupils should miss as little time as possible— every learning opportunity matters!

The school will implement strategies in order to improve attendance for any child who's absence is falling below 96%, who has a pattern of erratic attendance, or persistent lateness. Our full policy can be found on the school website. We look forward to working in collaboration with you in order to ensure your child is present in school and can learn to their full potential.



Pupil Premium

Pupil premium is additional funding given to school for extra support and to help close the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils.

Please read the information within the Pupil Premium statement on the website which gives details of our Pupil Premium Grant and how we allocate the funding. The Pupil Premium Grant is a sum of money that is allocated to school to

ensure that all children have an equal chance to succeed. Your child may qualify for Pupil Premium. If you qualify your child will receive free school meals, discounted school trips and classroom targeted interventions.

Please complete a Pupil Premium application form from the office if you think you are eligible to receive.



Nursery Provision

We are proud to offer our Nursery provision that starts from 3 years old.

You can apply for a place at our fantastic Nursery 'Acorns' the term after your child turns 3 years old. Please enquire at the school office and about funding available. We currently offer 15 hour and 30 hour funding depending on your eligibility.





Wrap Around Care

We are very proud to offer an extensive provision offer to support all of our families.

Breakfast Club

Our breakfast club starts every day from 07:45. The children will be provided with a selection of cereals, toast and fruit juices as well as a variety of fun activities. The cost of this is £5 a session.

Payment and Booking

For Breakfast Club, we require bookings and payment in advance for the purpose of staffing via Parent Pay. Bookings will only be accepted with payment. Places are limited so will be allocated on a first come first served basis. The full terms and conditions will be provided within the Extended Services Policy which is provided upon booking. You can read the full policy on the website.

Afterschool Club

Our After School Club is run by an external provider 'Premier Education' and operates between 15:15 and 18:00. Children will be provided with a light healthy snack, a drink and there are lots of fun activities for them to enjoy. The club is open for the whole school year for pupils in Reception to Year 6

Early Years

Preparation for Early Years

Understanding Spoken Instructions

Classroom instructions often contain several parts for children to remember. A simple game of 'Simon Says' during long car journeys this summer could really help. Give your child an instruction to do, like 'Simon says put your finger on your nose' and see if they can follow your instruction. You can challenge your child further by giving them 3 instructions in one go.

Mathematical Development

One-to-one counting is of great benefit to your children and when completed in a practical 'real world' way can be a great source of confidence for your children too. It can also be done incidentally throughout the day, for example counting steps as your child climbs the stairs.

You can also help your child learn about colours by looking for different colours throughout the day. Learning about the position of objects will also ensure your child can tell us where certain items that they require are. We use White Rose Maths in Reception and there are lots of online resources to support you at home with this too.

Phonics Development

Children in Reception will start their RWInc journey within two weeks of starting with us. This will include learning sounds, blending and segmenting. We will host RWInc workshops to help develop parental understanding throughout the term. It would be fantastic if you could practise name writing at home too.



Early Years Curriculum

Communication and language focuses on developing speech and ensuring that children can use a variety of language in conversation. A focus on listening and attention ensures that children develop the skills needed to listen and respond appropriately.

Personal, social and emotional development focuses on ensuring that children are able to manage their behaviour in different situations and understand the complex social world that they live in.

Physical development focuses on both large movements and small movements. A big focus for the start of the year will be developing pencil grip and beginning to form letters correctly.

Literacy development focuses on developing your child's reading and writing skills by exploring a love for reading and developing a growing phonetical understanding.

Mathematics A focus on mathematical language ensures that children can discuss the world around them. We will also focus on recognising, ordering and counting to 10. Children will also learn about number bonds, odds and evens and number facts.

Understanding the world develops the children's understanding of the world around them through a variety of sources, technology, observations and experiments being a few.

Expressive arts and design develops the children's creative abilities and allows them to develop their own preferences using a variety of materials. The children will have the opportunity to explore messy play, instruments and using different media.





Preparation for Nursery

Social Skills

Being able to interact appropriately with other children and share resources is a key skill that will help your child when they start school. Play dates with other children will help to promote these skills and you could arrange these with future classmates if possible. During the play date, you can model useful social phrases such as 'my turn please' or 'let's share' and join in with pretend play to start the game off and then fade out as children get into character.

Communication and Language

Many parents worry if their child will be able to tell the teacher if they need something or if they will make friends. Good communication skills underpin these abilities.

Your child may be starting Nursery with identified communication difficulties, or you may have concerns that have not yet been addressed. If this is something you are concerned about please speak with the Nursery teachers so that can reassure, and work closely, with you.

Listening and Attention Skills

Your child will be given many spoken instructions throughout the school day and will need to be able to shift their attention from what they are doing to listening to what the teacher is saying. A lovely activity to promote this is to go on a 'listening walk' where your child listens for all the sounds around them in the park or town centre. You could also jot down all the sounds your child notices and talk about these back at home to retell the journey based on the sounds they heard.

Preparation for Reception

The period before a child starts Reception for some parents can be an anxious time. The following information is a simple guide to how you can best prepare your child for this exciting time in their lives!

Promoting Independence

Your child will really benefit from being as independent as possible when they start Reception. Of course, teaching staff will always be on hand to help, but children feel a real sense of achievement when they can accomplish things by themselves! For example: being able to go to the toilet independently, put on and take off their coats and gather their own belongings.

Children in Reception have access to an outdoor environment throughout the day, so being able to put their coat on and zip it up independently will really help them-as will being able to put on a pair of wellies and taking off their jumper.

Another important part of being independent at school is being able to use the toilet independently, including washing and drying their hands. Being able to eat their snack independently will be really helpful as children will be encouraged to get their own milk and fruit as much as possible.

Children in Reception will also take part in lunchtimes whilst in school and will need to be able to cut their own food and feed themselves. It would be fantastic if you could practise this at home too. An activity we like to use to practise this is to cut slices of bread into different shapes.

Transition into Early Years

Parent/Carer Welcome Meeting

Parents and carers are invited to join us on **Tuesday 3rd June 2024 at 17:00 – 18:00** to meet some of the staff and hopefully get all the information you need ahead of your children starting in September.

We will have a number of staff in attendance, including our EYFS teaching team, to introduce themselves, share key information and be on hand to answer any questions you may have.

Transition Day

Children in Nursery and Reception are invited to join us on our transition day on **Wednesday 2nd July 2024** to come and experience a day at Lower Farm and allow us to get to know them and them to know us ahead of starting in September.

Included into the transition day are showing the children:

- Where their pegs are
- Where they sit
- Routes around school
- Early Years outdoor space
- Reception – Year 2 playground
- The dinner hall

The Children will also explore a range of activities already set up for them both indoors and outdoors, as well as being able to choose for themselves what they would like to explore.

Home Visits

In order to get the most up to date information to help us welcome and support your children, we will be conducting home visits for both Nursery and Reception children in September. We will complete a home visit with yourselves between **Wednesday 3rd and Friday 5th September 2025** so that we can again learn how we can best support your child(ren) when they start with us the following week.

You will be given an appointment slot for one of these days in due course and a member of the teaching team will come and visit you at home and get to know you and your child(ren). This is an invaluable part of the transition process.

Starting School

Reception and Nursery children will start with us on **Monday 8th September 2025**. During our settling in period, we will complete an individual baseline assessment of each child. The children will have plenty of open-ended activities set up daily for them to explore as well as access to all other resources in the environments.

We have always found that starting on full days is best as most children have attended nursery/preschool settings already and are used to full days. If you feel your child(ren) may need a tailored approach, please speak to a member of the team at our parent/carers welcome meeting

Setting Visits

For our new Reception children, prior to the summer holidays we will arrange visits to Nursery settings in order to gather information so we can best support your child(ren) when they start school in September.





Phonics in Reception Class

At Lower Farm Academy we use Read Write Inc. Phonics, a very popular and successful literacy programme to ensure that these two foci are being delivered securely from a very early age. This is delivered in Reception and Year 1. This way of teaching phonics equips the children with the tools they need to decode texts.

Your child will learn to read in a very simple way. He or she will learn to:

1. Read letters by their 'sounds'
2. Blend these sounds into words
3. Read the words in a story

The sounds which provide the children with the tools to read are split into three groups:

1. **Set 1 sounds** are sounds written with one letter, as well as some common digraphs (sh, ch, th, qu, ng, nk, ck, ss, ll, ff, zz)
2. **Set 2 sounds** (ay, ee, igh, ow, oo, oo, ar, or, air, ir, ou, oy)
3. **Set 3 sounds** (ea, oi, a-e, i-e, o-e, u-e, aw, are, ur, er, ow, ai, oa, ew, ire, ear, ure)

Your child will be taught to say the sound for the letter and not the letter name to begin with. Some children will also benefit from our focused and targeted interventions to further support the development of their early reading.

Phonics in Nursery Class

Nursery will complete Phase 1 Phonics activities daily (listening games), and they will then begin the Read Write Inc programme in the Summer term.

Setting up the SeeSaw App

To get you set up on SeeSaw, we will provide a QR code for your child's individual profile once they start school in September. This is a private account so others will not have access to your child's learning journal.

You can log on to SeeSaw at any time and see your child's profile. You will see observations uploaded from school, which will include both observations of your child individually, as well as group and whole class learning activities. Teachers will share homework menus and half-termly overviews of the curriculum so you can further support your child's learning at home. Teachers will also share weekly overviews of the learning and activities so you can discuss this with your child at home.

SeeSaw is also used to support your child's reading progress. Teachers upload Phonics videos weekly that are linked to your child's Phonics level. These videos are part of the RWInc scheme and include games and interactive opportunities for your child to practise their reading. They are a fun and engaging addition to the books your child will take home each week in their reading packs.

If you would like to share learning from home on SeeSaw, you can upload pictures and videos of your child's achievements with a brief description of what they have done/said. You can also add comments to posts uploaded by teachers.

Finally, you can contact your child's class teacher using the 'Message' feature on SeeSaw.
